U.S. LAW AND ETHICS OF HUMAN SUBJECTS RESEARCH

Researchers in the biomedical and behavioral and social sciences study people—in order to understand and counter disease, to foster medical advance, to improve health and education, and to better understand people's troubles, beliefs, behavior, and hopes. Research on human beings incurs special ethical and legal responsibilities.

This seminar (the companion course to International Law and Ethics of Human Subjects Research) brings together individuals from many fields to foster interdisciplinary understanding of the substance and interrelationships of U.S. law and ethics in the protection of human subjects of research.

This seminar is for graduate students, faculty, professionals, practitioners, researchers, research administrators, and other interested individuals from the many fields (including health, law, medicine, science, government, and philosophy and ethics) involved directly or indirectly in research on persons.
